We also believe that "the formation of conscience occurs in community, but its exercise is very often finally an individual matter. Because the individual is the bearer of conscience, it does not matter whether others of the same faith make the same conscientious claim, a point now recognized in constitutional interpretation (Thomas v. Review Board, 1981). to believe the same on all things. But it is always instructive to know what our governing bodies have proclaimed. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has a long history of support for gun control legislation. Beginning in the late 1960s, in response to the assassinations of public leaders, the General Assembly called for "... control [of] the sale and possession of fire arms of all kinds."(1) In 1976 this statement was reaffirmed, but also specifically worded to "... not cover shotguns and rifles used legitimately by sportsmen ..."(2) In 1988 these and other statements supporting gun control were again reaffirmed. A fuller statement was approved in 1990. In it the General Assembly went on record as: Support[ing] gun control

the most effective response to the present crisis of gun violence ... Call[ing] upon the United States government to establish meaningful and effective federal legislation to regulate the importation, manufacture, sale, and possession of guns and ammunition by the general public. Such legislation should include provisions for the registration and licensing of gun purchasers and owners, appropriate background inment of similar state and local laws, should such federal legislation be agencies at all levels to provide sig-This means that we do not all have nificant assistance to victims of gun violence and their families.(3) In 1998, the General Assembly added to its policy by calling on all Presbyremoving handguns and assault weapons from our homes and our communities; and seek ways to develop community strategies and create sanctuaries of safety for our children, so that all of our children may come to identify and value themselves and others as the precious children of the family of God that they are, and that they may come to learn peace for their lives and peace for this generation.(4) In 2000, the General Assembly reaffirmed the church's commitment to gun control and called for strengthening gun ownership legislation.(5) In 2008, the General Assembly approved pas-
