## PASTOR'S CORNER

As I was thinking about what to write on for this month's Pastor's Corner, this article magically appeared by email. It is a short and concise argument for why we Presbyterians support those who get vaccinated, and those who urge others to do so. Please take time to read and think about what our Stated Clerk has to say about this very timely subject.

"The theological commitments of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) compel us to support vaccination against COVID-19 for all people except those who are unable to receive the vaccines due either to age or medical condition. Because we believe in the God who urged the people of God to "seek the good of the city" (Jeremiah 29:7) where they were located, a city that was not even their native home, we urge all people to be vaccinated. Because we are followers of the Jesus Christ who requires us "to love the Lord your God ... and your neighbor as yourself" (Luke 10:27), we urge all people to get vaccinated. Because we confess, as a matter of our religious belief, that "the members of the church are emissaries of peace and seek the good of all in cooperation with powers and authorities in politics, culture, and economics" (Confession of 1967), we urge all to seek the good of all, to love their neighbor and get vaccinated.

The need for vaccination has been clear for months. It is utterly compelling now. The variants of the coronavirus are harming thousands, infecting us at rates our medical system is straining to handle. Those who are infected by the variants of COVID-19 are overwhelmingly people who have not been fully vaccinated — more than 90% of those now becoming infected.

Getting vaccinated is also fulfilling the command to love our neighbors. Those who refuse to be vaccinated are prolonging the pandemic and spreading the coronavirus and its variants to people who cannot receive the vaccine, including children and people with compromised immune systems, and carrying it to people who have been fully vaccinated, causing "breakthrough infections." As hospitals fill with those fighting COVID-19, there is less room and less time for those facing other serious health conditions.

Let us be clear. Scripture and our confession of faith lead us to call on all people to be vaccinated the vaccines due either to age or medical condition. Our faith, our religious convictions, leave us understanding of Christian faith; we stand with other Christians as we urge getting vaccinated."

## PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (U.S.A.) MINISTER SURVEY

A survey was completed by PC (USA) because they regularly receive questions from members, congregational staff, mid councils and PC (USA) leaders. This report is just part of what has been learned. The report was completed by Angie Andriot, PhD and Susan Barnett, PhD with assistance from Research Services.

#### Overview:

The survey was a massive 110 question survey. It was one of the Board of Pensions' Call to Health challenges. 23% of the denomination's 19,243 ministers (4,507) responded to the survey. 24% of the respondents are retired and not working.

This report provides an overview of who took the survey, including what roles and positions they hold, where and how pastors serve, family life,

and demographics.

81% of employed ministers are pastors. (A minister is ordained to service in any number of positions.) (A pastor is ordained to a congregation and can include ministers.) 30% are honorably retired. 10% of ministers have more than one type of position.

92% of the respondents are white versus 88% of PC (USA) ministers.

61% of the respondents are males versus 68% of PC (USA) ministers.

88% speak English only.
5% are Immigrants.
1% are not U.S. citizens.
3% have a Disability requiring accommodation.
37% of the respondents are 65 or older versus 57% of PC

(USA) ministers.

Overall PC (USA) Minister Facts
Over half are over the age of
65. There are very few PC
(USA) Ministers in their 20's.
Women outnumber men in



every age group except the 65 and older age group.

Political Issues for respondents
63% are Democrats.
11% are Republicans.
12% are Independents.
11% do not identify with a political party.

Ministers and their Families
82% of ministers are married.
9% are single/6% are divorced/2% are widowed/1% are living in a relationship.
17% have children under 18 at home.

15% of spouses and partners are also PC (USA) ministers. While 90% of the male ministers are married, only 68% of the female ministers are .


A special 150th Birthday Celebration Booklet is being prepared sharing current history and past history and a Special Sign has been ordered.

## **OUR COMMUNITY GARDEN**

### FALL SCARECROW CONTEST RULES & REGULATIONS

Sponsored by the First Presbyterian Church in Partnership with the Railside Golf Course/Gibson Area Golf LLC

**Location:** Community Garden at the Railside Golf Course

**Eligibility:** The Scarecrow Contest is open to all ages, businesses, organizations and groups. One entry per individual, family, business, organization or group. Space is limited so first come first served.

Categories: Traditional, Whimsical, Fairytale, Humorous, or Fantasy

**Entry Fee:** FREE – There is no cost to enter the contest. To participate, entrants must submit a registration form that is approved, sign a Memorandum of Understanding and have their scarecrow on display by the required time on the plot assigned to them.

**Five Prizes:** A \$200 award for each of the following categories - Most Creative, Funniest and Most Loveable awarded by judges from the First Presbyterian Church. A \$200 award for first place and second place of the People's Choice Award voted by members of the Community. There will be five \$100 runner-up awards. Awards will be paid by check.

**Construction:** Scarecrows must be handmade and use natural materials. NO commercial costumes, rubber or plastic masks will be allowed. Scarecrows must be self-supporting and durable and able to stand up to sun, wind, and rain. Use care in choosing your materials. All decorations must be firmly attached to your scarecrow and then to the post. We recommend a 2 x 4 piece of lumber for the central body. A broomstick or 2 x 4 is recommended for the arms. No perishable goods or glass please.

Size: The minimum is 4 feet tall and the maximum is 7 feet tall. We recommend securing your post in a 5 gallon bucket with several inches of cement in the bottom. Scarecrows must be secured in a manner that will not blow away and will not otherwise be a danger to or possibly cause injury to anyone. Owners are held solely responsible for the safety and security of their scarecrows.

The scarecrow contest exhibit is FAMILY FRIENDLY. Scarecrows should be whimsical, humorous, mischievous or lovable – Not frightening. Gruesome, bloody or especially scary entries will be disqualified and/or removed. The First Presbyterian Church representatives reserve the right to disqualify and/or remove entries they feel to be distasteful or not family friendly or do not comply with the rules.

Please name your scarecrow that explains their character and personality and include the name on a sign no larger than 11" x 17" along with your name and plot number.

#### **Timeline:**

Registration forms will be accepted from October 1 to October 8, 2021. Scarecrows must be constructed from October 9 to October 16, 2021. Judging will take place from October 17 to October 23, 2021.

Winners will be announced at the First Presbyterian Church's 150 Birthday Celebration to be held at the Church on Sunday, October 24, 2021. You need not be present to win.

**Removal:** All Scarecrows must be removed by the end of the day November 1, 2021.

Interpretation of these rules and decisions by the First Presbyterian Church representatives are final and cannot be challenged.

By entering the scarecrow competition, you confirm that you accept these rules and regulations.






