



Ron Clow, Worship Leader, introduced John Muirhead from the Champaign pulpit supply group who preached on June 5th while Pastor Lantz was on vacation.




Danny and Vonna Heustis added flags to the outside cross for Flag Day, June 14th, and the 4th of July.




