What Presbyterians Believe by Charles Wiley **Understanding Good and** Evil: No easy answers to our aching questions

Why do the wicked prosper? It's an age-old question the prophet Jeremiah asked of God (Jeremiah 12:1) that continues to bedevil us. Even though we experience goodness every day, we also experience evil in human actions and devastation from natural disasters. What do we make of this confusing mix of good and evil?

The classic theological answer is best articulated in the Study Catechism, which was approved by the 210th General Assembly (1998) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). In it, Question 14 asks: "If God's love is powerful beyond measure. why is there so much evil in the world?" The answer is: "No one can say why, for evil is a terrible abyss beyond all rational explanation. Its ultimate origin is obscure. Its enormity perplexes us."

We respond by affirming that "God's triumph over evil is certain, knowing that in Jesus Christ god suffers with us, knowing all our sorrows. We can live in hope because

God raised Jesus from the dead and "is himself God's promise that suffering will come to an end, that death shall be no more, and that all things will be made new."

This answer is both true and helpful. But when confronted by evil, even nuanced answers fail us. Sometime we must give way to the poet.

In "A Prayer for the Days of Awe," Elle Wiesel, author and Nobel laureate, reflects on the horror of the Holocaust and how it shaped his experience of God. He stands in the tradition of job and confronts God with raw honesty. In Wiesel's ago-nizing words—"What hurt me more: your absence or your silence?" - we hear the echo of our Lord on the cross: "My God, my God, why have vou forsaken me?"

What we have in Wiesel's prayer is an engaged, searching, intimate portrait of prayer to God. The anger zine. and reconciliation offered here are possible only in a context where relationship is possible. For people who claim a tradition that sometimes understands God as too remote to be wrestled with. Wiesel's grappling proves instructive. The problem of suffering is not neatly tied up. It is answered with an oblique statement as eloquent as it is brief: "Auschwitz must and will forever remain a question mark only: it can be conceived neither with god nor without God."

As terrible as it is to experience The prophet Samuel reminds us: "Thus far the Lord has helped us" (I

evil, it would be even worse to experience it without God. We believe God is always with us, but that belief is strengthened by our searching and being in relationship with God.





Samuel 7:12). And that help will never cease. When it seems the wicked prosper and evil is winning over good, we move forward by faith, with probing honesty about God and ourselves, working for justice and living in hope that one day all things will be made new.

THE NEW FLOWER CHART IS up on the bulletin board outside of the secretary's office.

The meaning behind October's name is far from accurate these days. The ancient Roman calendar was based on the lunar cycles, as opposed to our current calendar which is based on the solar cycles. This meant that there were originally 10 months in their calendar, and October was the eighth month. Its name literally translated into "the eighth month" in Latin. In 451 BC the two months of Ianurarius and Februarius were added to the beginning of the calendar, making October the 10th month.

The Anglo-Saxons' name for October was Winterfylleth, with its name containing the words for winter and full moon respectively. It was named this because winter was said to begin from the first full moon of the month.

The Saxons had a name for October, too. Theirs was Wyn Monath, which translated into "wine month" because it was the time of the year for making wine. I'm not sure about you, but I think October just became my favorite month!




