
WORSHIP LEADERS

Thank you Rev. Connie Bandy for preaching on July 27th. We enjoyed your message on the importance of prayer.







August has changed its number of days multiple times. In the tenmonth Roman calendar, the months all had either 30 or 31 days, totaling 304 days in the year. Not only did Pompilius add January and February to the calendar, but he also reduced the number of days in August down to 29. It wasn't until Julius Caesar introduced the Julian calendar that it was left with 31 days, and it's stayed the same ever since!

August is also a little bit unique, most of the time at least. In a standard year, there is no other month that begins on the same day of the week as August. In a leap year, however, August begins on the same day of the week as February.

The full moon closest to the Autumnal Equinox, typically in September, is popularly known as the Harvest Moon. The name comes from the fact that the moonrise occurs shortly after sunset on these nights, providing an abundance of bright moonlight early in the evening. This was traditionally helpful to farmers harvesting their summer-grown crops, hence the name Harvest Moon.

International Talk Like a Pirate Day is celebrated globally on September 19th. This fun and quirky holiday encourages people to converse and jest in the manner of classic seafaring pirates. Originating in 1995 by John Baur and Mark Summers, it gained popularity when humor columnist Dave Barry covered it in a 2002 article. The day is marked by pirate-themed events, parties, and even special promotions, adding a touch of whimsy and swashbuckling fun to the usual routine.


SO MANY WAYS WE HELP OTHERS

2nd Sunday Collection -GIBSON AREA SERVICE ASSOCIATION (GASA)



THANK YOU FROM THE CLOWS

Words cannot express my sincere appreciation for the love and kindness Ron and I were shown by our Church Family in the loss and tragic death of my nephew Battalion Fire Chief Frank Harwood in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. This includes the donations made to me, to my twin sister Nancy and to my nephew Eric to help with travel costs and donations to the Red and Blue Foundation that coordinated and paid for the funeral services. We would also like to thank everyone for their visits and calls and the many cards and messages received during this sad time. I would especially like to thank Meladee Ferguson, Jean Williams, Sharla Williams and Elizabeth Cope.

My nephew was always my hero but is now a hero to the world. He is the oldest son of my twin sister and grew up in Wisconsin and served in the Army National Guard where he met his wife Meghan also serving in the National Guard. They served in Iraq together and after returning home, decided to get married and move to Coeur d'Alene. He then joined the Kootenai County Fire Department serving for 17 years working his way up to Battalion Fire Chief. They have two daughters.

The letter from Frank's Uncle Paul Harwood on the next page explains what we experienced upon our arrival at Coeur d'Alene. The Celebration of Life was amazing. Frank's casket was placed on top of a firetruck draped in black and driven to a golf resort where the funeral was held followed by Frank's 21 family members on a chartered bus. Citizens lined the streets with flags to show their respect. We were greeted at the resort by 3,000 additional firemen, policemen and army personnel standing at attention in dress uniform lining the road to the open-air facility overlooking Lake Coeur d'Alene. Greeting us inside was a 150 drum and bagpipe band and three army helicopters were flying overhead performing the "Missing Man Formation Flyby". The service was attended by 500 people inside and 500 people outside who were watching on a monitor. Frank's wife, brother and 3 friends spoke and a letter from his mother was read. The family was then taken by bus to the cemetery, where he received military burial honors including a 21-gun salute. Upon returning to the resort, Frank's favorite band was playing, food and drinks were served, and several yard games were being played by the many firemen and children in attendance. Frank loved being outside and playing yard games with family and friends. It is something Frank would have wanted.

It was apparent Frank was loved and touched many lives. One young lady on social media wrote he was her angel as she remembered his calm voice and blue eyes as he cut her out of a vehicle after a car accident. The bond between firefighters is amazing and they will not forget their fallen brother. He will be remembered in his community as a family man, leader, and firefighter. We ask for continued prayers for Frank's family as we try to live our lives without Frank but in the way he led his life. He will be missed, but not forgotten.
